Sometimes, I have a composition in mind and search for a specific object. Other times, I find objects that are interesting and hope for inspiration later. Shapes, colors, and patterns are starting points for composition. The images are taken against a black background to emphasize the objects and their interplay. In the .narrative framework, they are a series of short stories
